Rationale for student taking this course:

Drawing II is a foundation course, required for all Art Degrees. This course may be used as a Fine Art elective for other degrees. For degree and non-degree seeking students, Drawing I increases observation techniques while exploring drawing principals. The projects will expand students' ability to see and more accurately perceive their environment. Students' creative skills and imagination are enhanced.

Course description:

Drawing 102 is an introduction to the basic principles, materials, and skills of freehand drawing from life. The course synthesizes studies in representation, proportion, perspective, value, and composition. Additional art supplies will be required. (Open to non-Art majors and minors)

Requirements for course outline:

COURSE GRADING POLICY:

Students are graded according to their own individual effort and progress, not against other students work. Students will **CONTRACT FOR A GRADE** at the beginning of the semester. Students may alter a grade by signing and submitting a new contract.

To qualify for the grade of "C", students are expected to:

1. Attend and participate in all of the weekly class sessions.
2. Submit any 8 of the assigned art projects on designated due date (see schedule).
3. Participate in oral discussions and critiques.
4. Regularly maintain drawings and writings in a bound sketchbook.

To qualify for the grade of “B”, students are expected to:

1. Attend and participate in all of the weekly class sessions.
2. Submit a total of 9 projects on designated due dates (see schedule).
3. Participate in oral discussions and critiques.
4. Regularly maintain drawings and writings in a bound sketchbook.

To qualify for the grade of “A”, students are expected to:

1. Attend and participate in all of the weekly class sessions.
2. Submit a total of 10 projects on designated due dates, (see schedule)
3. Participate in oral discussions and critiques.
4. Regularly maintain drawings and writings in a bound sketchbook.

QUALITY CONTROL:

Student work may receive a CHECKMARK indicating successful completion, or a REDO, indicating some revision of the work is needed. This method is used to maintain high standards for all student work. Three re-do’s will lower the students grade by one letter.

Reasons for re-do:

- 1) Student did not follow instructions.
- 2) Student did not do his/her best work.
- 3) Project submitted in poor condition.

OTHER POLICIES:

Students are expected to bring all art supplies and/or photographs necessary for artwork on each class date, unless otherwise instructed.

WITHDRAWAL:

Consult the current catalog for information concerning course withdrawal deadlines. Before considering withdrawal, students are urged to discuss their concerns with the instructor.

ABSENCES:

Three unexcused absences will lower the student’s final grade by one letter. Students should contact the instructor the week following an absence.

LATE WORK:

Homework will only be accepted during the actual class time. Students should get their assignments from the instructor (not classmates) the week following an absence. Three late assignments will lower the student’s final grade by one letter. No late assignments will be excused. Each assignment will only be marked **“LATE”** once, no matter how many weeks it’s actually late. *No work will be accepted on the last day of class.*

SUBMISSION OF ASSIGNMENTS:

Most drawings should be covered with tracing paper for instructor’s comments and to avoid damage to student’s work. Tracing paper shall be hinged to the top edge of all drawings with two pieces of tape.

Homework submitted must be labeled in lower right corner as follows:

- A) Student’s name
- B) Name and day of the class

- C) The date the project is submitted
- D) The project number
- E) If the project is late, write late above student's name
- F) If the project is being resubmitted after receiving a redo, write "redone and resubmitted" above student's name

UTILIZE THIS CALENDAR BY MARKING THE STATUS OF SUBMITTED WORK BESIDE THE CORRECT DUE DATE. By including all checks, lates, re-dos, and absences; students will be able to calculate their grade throughout the semester.

Every attempt will be made to maintain the format and the time limitations set forth in this schedule. However, due to unforeseen events or occurrences, this schedule may be altered at the volition of the instructor.

Expected student outcomes or competencies:

1. Students will attend each class meeting in order to stay current with all course expectations. (10%)
2. Students will explore and utilize “right-brain” methods to develop their observation skills. (10%)
3. Students will explore shading fundamentals and demonstrate skills in a variety of pencil drawings. (15%)
4. Students will recognize the geometric forms underlying realistic objects and correctly render them from different perspectives. (10%)
5. Students will learn portrait proportions, characteristics of individual facial features, and proper shading techniques and demonstrate these skills in sketches and final drawings. (10%)
6. Students will learn different shading methods using ink or markers and demonstrate their skills by drawing and shading various projects. (10%)
7. Students will participate in class critiques of student art work, targeting areas of needed improvement and point out areas showing skill in proper techniques, good composition, and shading. (10%)
8. Students will supplement their drawing skills by making regular entries in their sketchbooks. (10%)
9. Students will demonstrate proper perspective skills inherent in each submitted project. (15%)

Requisites for the course: None.

Integration of critical skills:

1. Students will demonstrate their critical thinking skills by planning and executing major drawings in pencil and ink. They will combine elements of composition along with technical aspects of perspective, proportion, shading, balance and proper use of material.
2. Students will access our library as well as computer websites to view other artists' works and examples of various drawing mediums.
3. Students will create a bibliography of library and website listings as a part of their assignments.
4. During project critiques, students will demonstrate the critical skills of public speaking and group work.
5. Students will write homework instructions and descriptively evaluate both their drawings and perceptions of their own progress. These writings will be interspersed throughout their sketchbooks.
