Rationale for student taking this course:

Painting II is a foundation course, required for the Studio Arts Degree. This course may be used as a Fine Art elective for other degrees. For degree and non-degree seeking students, Painting II increases observation techniques and color skills while exploring the principals of fine arts. The projects will expand students' ability to see and more accurately depict their environment. Students' creative skills and imagination are enhanced.

Course description:

Continuation of ART 221 utilizing skills with acrylics, oils, and watercolors. Work from life is supplemented with the development of the relationship of form to idea in painting. Additional art supplies will be required.

Expected student outcomes or competencies:

1. Students will attend each class meeting in order to stay current with all course expectations. (20%)
2. Students will explore and utilize "right-brain" methods to develop their observation skills. (5%)
3. Students will explore painting fundamentals and demonstrate skills in a variety of painting problems. (40%)
4. Students will supplement their art skills by making regular drawing entries in their sketchbooks. (10%)
5. Students will demonstrate proper procedures to sketching still life and landscape subject matters. (10%)
6. Students will be verbally proficient in describing stylistic differences in many important painters. (10%)
7. Students will participate in class critiques of student art work, targeting areas of needed improvement and point out areas showing skill in proper painting techniques, good composition, and shading. (5%)

Requisites for the course:

Drawing 101 and Painting 221 or consent of instructor

Integration of critical skills:

1. Students will demonstrate their critical thinking skills by planning and executing paintings in oil and watercolor. They will combine elements of color and composition along with technical aspects of perspective, proportion, shading, balance and proper use of materials.
2. Students will create a bibliography of library and website listings as a part of their assignments.
3. Students will site their website listings as a part of their assignments.
4. During project critiques, students will demonstrate the critical skills of public speaking and group work.
5. Students will write homework instructions and descriptively evaluate both their drawings and perceptions of their own progress. These writings will be interspersed throughout their sketchbooks.

Requirements for course outline:

COURSE GRADING POLICY:

Students are graded according to their own individual effort and progress, not against other students work. Students will **CONTRACT FOR A GRADE** at the beginning of the semester. Students may alter a grade by signing and submitting a new contract.

To qualify for the grade of “C”, students are expected to:

1. Attend and participate in all of the weekly class sessions.
2. Submit any 8 of the assigned art projects on designated due dates.
3. Participate in oral discussions and critiques.
4. Regularly maintain sketches and writings in a bound sketchbook.

To qualify for the grade of “B”, students are expected to:

1. Attend and participate in all of the weekly class sessions.
2. Submit a total of 9 projects on designated due dates.
3. Participate in oral discussions and critiques.
4. Regularly maintain drawings and writings in a bound sketchbook.
5. Submit a bibliography of sited library and websites relating to painting.

To qualify for the grade of “A”, students are expected to:

1. Attend and participate in all of the weekly class sessions.
2. Submit a total of 10 projects on designated due dates.
3. Participate in oral discussions and critiques.
4. Regularly maintain drawings and writings in a bound sketchbook.
5. Submit a bibliography of sited library and websites relating to painting.
6. Paint at least 3 color sketches on location in “En plein air”.

QUALITY CONTROL:

Student work may receive a CHECKMARK indicating successful completion, or a REDO, indicating some revision of the work is needed. This method is used to maintain high standards for all student work. Three re-do's will lower the students grade by one letter.

Reasons for re-do:

- 1) Student did not follow instructions.

- 2) Student did not do his/her best work.
- 3) Project submitted in poor condition.

OTHER POLICIES:

Students are expected to bring all art supplies and/or photographs necessary for artwork on each class date, unless otherwise instructed.

WITHDRAWAL:

Consult the current catalog for information concerning course withdrawal deadlines. Before considering withdrawal, students are urged to discuss their concerns with the instructor.

ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS:

Attendance is required for each session. Do not call to report an upcoming absence. When circumstances make attendance impossible, report an absence to the instructor the following week. Three unexcused absences will lower the student's final grade by one letter unless the instructor is advised in writing and agrees with the reason, such as hospitalization, etc.

LATE WORK:

Homework will only be accepted during the actual class time. Students should get their assignments from the instructor (not classmates) the week following an absence. Three late assignments will lower the student's final grade by one letter. No late assignments will be excused. Each assignment will only be marked "**LATE**" once, no matter how many weeks it's actually late. *No work will be accepted on the last day of class.*

SUBMISSION OF ASSIGNMENTS:

Most paintings should be covered with tracing paper for instructor's comments and to avoid damage to student's work. Tracing paper shall be hinged to the top edge of all paintings with two pieces of tape.

Homework submitted must be labeled on back as follows:

- A) Student's name
- B) Name and day of the class
- C) The date the project is submitted
- D) The project number
- E) If the project is late, write late above student's name
- F) If the project is being resubmitted after receiving a redo, write "redone and resubmitted" above student's name
